





# Regional Seminar: Strengthening the capacity of local governments on migration and human mobility issues

September 12 and 13, 2022

## San Salvador, El Salvador

Concept Note – Content- Methodology

# BACKGROUNDS

International migration has become a determining factor in the twenty-first century. In quantitative terms, the number of international migrants has been constant over the past two decades, reaching 281 million people living outside their country of origin by 2020. <sup>1</sup> Even more indicative of the scale of human mobility globally, 1 in 7 people is on the move (considering the estimates of internal migrants).<sup>2</sup>

Other factors that demonstrate the importance of migration for the various socio-political levels are the different reasons that drive migration, the impact of migration on economies and societies of countries of origin, transit and destination, on migrants and their families, and on national policies and international relations.

With the intensification of migratory flows in the region, and the change of our societies in technological, economic, social, and political terms, along with climate change, natural disasters, and environmental degradation, it has become even more important to know how to manage this phenomenon, considering the human and labor rights of migrants, and the needs and priorities of countries of origin, transit and destination.

#### JUSTIFICATION

While migration governance has traditionally been approached from the national level due to its normative and institutional nature, the importance of its approach at the local level has been emphasized. The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development highlights in its objectives not only the improvement of migration

governance through the implementation of planned and well-managed migration policies (SDG 10), but also the work towards inclusive cities, through affordable housing, which can benefit migrants. (SDG 11).<sup>3</sup>

Likewise, the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly, and Regular Migration (PMM) recognizes the role of local authorities and communities in meeting its objectives. For example, Objective 23 states that it should: "Strengthen international cooperation and global partnerships for safe, orderly and regular migration"; calls for "Engaging and supporting local authorities in identifying needs and opportunities for international cooperation to effectively implement the Global Compact and incorporating their perspectives and priorities into development strategies and programs and migration planning, as a means of ensuring good governance as well as policy coherence between different levels of government and policy sectors, and maximize the effectiveness and impact of international development cooperation." <sup>4</sup> In addition to being reflected in the pan-social approach, the importance of the role of local authorities and communities is highlighted in Objectives 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15, 16, 17, 19, and 21.

The Progress Declaration of the International Migration Review Forum adopted by the United Nations General Assembly in May 2022 recognizes that progress has been made in integrating international migration into development plans and sectoral policies at the local level. The Declaration highlights efforts to provide equal and safe access to affordable essential services, including health care and vaccines, to all migrants, regardless of their migration status, in the effective response to the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly at the local level. In addition, it reaffirmed the crucial role of the local level, for example, by promoting the contributions of migrants at all levels of competence related to sustainable development at the local, national, regional, and global levels within the framework of the 2030 Agenda<sup>5</sup>.

The Global Organization of United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG), the largest organization of local and regional governments in the world, states in the preamble of its statute that "local governments (...) they must play a fundamental role in guaranteeing the effective exercise of the human rights of all its inhabitants." <sup>6</sup> In this sense, the involvement of local governments in migration governance is essential to ensure respect for the rights of migrants and their integration into host communities.

IOM collaborates with UCLG in different instances, including the Mayors Mechanism of the Global Forum on Migration and Development and the Global Cities Fund. In the region, IOM cooperates with the Latin American Federation of Cities, Municipalities, and Associations of Local Governments (FLACMA), UCLG's regional section for Latin America.



IOM has provided technical cooperation to at least 15 local governments in countries of Mexico and Central America to develop <u>reports on migration governance indicators</u> (IGM) based on the Migration Governance Framework (MiGOF) that IOM Member States adopted in 2015. The MGI works as a tool based on the analysis of the structures of migration governance that presents a series of guidelines on the instruments that the State could use to develop its migration governance. It evaluates only the institutional, legal and public policy framework on migration, without evaluating its implementation in practice. The MGI can be used as a frame of reference to identify measures that countries could adopt to strengthen their migration governance structures.

The following map illustrates the municipalities where local governments have conducted or are in the process of finalizing their reports on migration governance indicators (MGI):

Considering the relevance of this integrated approach in the region, in 2021 the first *Training Program in Migration Policies and Governance was carried out with a focus on the local and municipal level*, under the Pro-Tempore Presidency of the Regional Conference on Migration (CRM) led by Mexico. The Program focused on strengthening the capacities of actors at the local level in the field of migration policies and other related policies, through a virtual course on migration trends, a high-level panel with international experts, and three virtual







sessions. As a result of this Programme, one of the main recommendations was to support the capacity-building of local governments in migration policy and governance.

Preceding this recommendation, the "Seminar for the enhancement of capacities for local governments in human mobility issues" seeks to adopt an integrated approach to migration governance, in which local government officials improve their technical capacities in the design, implementation, and monitoring of public policies related to human mobility.

In line with the Pro-Tempore Presidency 2022 (PPT) Work Plan, this diploma reflects the cross-cutting axes of capacity building and regional cooperation by promoting a better understanding of human mobility, its trends, and existing frameworks for its management, and the benefits through an integrated approach. Due to the nature of migration, its governance must be addressed from various levels of government, through a regional and global perspective.

In addition, it should be noted that for the PPT of El Salvador this regional effort is simultaneously a step to consolidate its efforts on the matter as a country. The Government of El Salvador, with the technical assistance of different UN agencies, has developed a Specialized Course for the Governance of Orderly, Safe and Regular Migration from the Municipalities in 15 municipal mayors' offices, 5 in the eastern zone, and 10 in the western zone. One of the main results of this training process is that within the framework of the training, strategies have been developed for attention to the migrant population at the local level.

Below are the objectives and curriculum design of the Regional Seminar.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

• General objective: To strengthen the knowledge and technical capacity of local government officials in the RCM Members Countries in the design, implementation, and evaluation of public policies related to human mobility.

#### • Specific objectives:

- 1. Understand the role of local authorities and authorities within the relevant global frameworks.
- 2. Identify the priorities and needs of local governments in terms of migration governance.
- **3.** Promote the use of conceptual and technical tools that allow the improvement of the understanding of the migratory phenomenon and its governance in local governments.

During the introductory session, in coordination with the Executive Secretariat of the RCM, participants will be asked to make a brief online consultation to assess their level of knowledge on the subject and their expectations of this activity. In the closing session, the online consultation will be sent back to the participants in order to assess the change in their level of knowledge on the subject, the level of satisfaction with their expectations, and the possible use of the knowledge acquired in their daily work. This test can be found within the E Campus platform.

As for the courses that will be studied prior to the face-to-face sessions, it should be noted that each course includes a knowledge test that allows obtaining the corresponding certificates. The seminar will be carried out through a hybrid methodology, face-to-face in San Salvador and virtually for the connection of certain panelists and participants.

## PARTICIPANT PROFILE

It is proposed to address the Regional Seminar to 2 representatives of 2 municipalities for each country. It is suggested to invite representatives of local governments making a balance between those who already have accumulated experience in the subject and those who are starting to work on the subject and require to strengthen their knowledge:

• 2 mayors or political authorities at the state or municipal level of 2 municipalities.

Persons designated by RCM Member Countries are expected to participate in all sessions described in the methodology section above. Participants who successfully attend all activities (online course and sessions), will receive a certificate of approval for the course/use of the Seminar.

Observer agencies of the RCM and the Regional Network of Civil Organizations for Migration (RROCM), who wish to participate, will be welcome, as well as the Ministries of Foreign Affairs of the member countries, which serve as focal points of the RCM.
