





II Workshop on Search Mechanisms for Missing Migrants

Concept Note August 25th and 26th, 2022 San Salvador, El Salvador

BACKGROUND

The search, location and identification of missing migrants is a challenge faced by many countries in the Americas, and one which the Member Countries of the Regional Conference on Migration (RCM) have identified as a priority. Coordination among States and with other non-state actors is essential to reach the common goal of ensuring that victims have access to truth and justice.

In a similar vein, international human rights mechanisms are also trying to set standards, with a differentiated approach, for the handling of cases of disappearances occurring in contexts of human mobility. The United Nations Committee on Enforced Disappearances (CED) has recently announced an upcoming <u>General comment on enforced disappearances in the context of migration</u>.

In May 2022 the CRM adopted <u>Recommendations on regional coordination and information exchange</u> <u>mechanisms in the search for missing persons in the context of migration</u> ("the Recommendations") and proposed a workshop to guide States in its implementation. This comes as a follow up to a series of workshops that took place in previous years:

- 2018. Workshop on "Guidelines for the coordination and exchange of information for the search of missing persons in the context of migration", held in San Jose, Costa Rica.
- 2019. Workshop on "Best practices of consular missions and ministries of foreign affairs in the search for missing migrants", held in Guatemala.
- 2021. Online workshop "Search Mechanisms for Missing Migrants", Mexico City, Mexico.

RATIONALE

The II Workshop on Search Mechanisms for Missing Migrants follows the Declaration of Vice-Ministers from the XXVI Vice-Ministerial Meeting of the RCM held in Mexico City on December 2nd and 3rd, 2021, which agreed:

"5. Update the calendar of the RCM according to the recommendations of the RCGM reviewed during the closed meeting between Vice-Ministers and in accordance with the Work Plan to be presented by El Salvador PPT 2022:

Working Group on Protection (...)













k. II Workshop on Search Mechanisms for Missing Migrants, with the Support of RNOCM, IOM and ICRC.

OBJECTIVES

• General Objective

Share the content of the "Recommendations on Regional Search Mechanisms for the Coordination and Exchange of Information for the Search of Missing Persons in the Context of Migration" and set the ground for the development of collaboration agreements between countries and other actors for the flow and exchange of information for the search and identification of missing migrants, the investigation of crimes committed against them, and the care, support, and rehabilitation of victims.

- Specific Objectives
- To facilitate reflections among representatives of RCM Member Countries and other partners on the challenges and opportunities for the implementation of the Recommendations.
- To raise awareness of existing national and regional mechanisms for coordinating the search, investigation, and forensic identification of possible migrants.
- To identify the type of information that should be shared directly by counterpart institutions and non-state actors in order to carry out the search process for missing migrants, both alive and deceased.
- To identify and learn about the types of Information Management Systems used by States for the registration, organization, filing and use of information.
- To establish a roadmap for the implementation of the Recommendations and to identify focal points.
- To define routes for the systematic flow and exchange of information for the search for missing migrants and the search for deceased persons until they are identified.
- To propose concrete actions to contact family members and to adequately respond to their needs for information and response.
- To identify regional forensic networks that might contribute to the implementation of the Recommendations.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

At the end of the workshop, participants will have a roadmap for the implementation of the Recommendations, including next steps for the consideration and follow-up of the issue.













METHODOLOGY

- An opening panel, providing an overview of the issue and of the role of countries of origin, transit and destination, counting with the participation of the PPT, ICRC, RNCOM, UN and Missing Persons' Family Associations.
- Each thematic block will be facilitated by either by RNCOM or by the ICRC and will begin with a presentation of the corresponding content of the Recommendations.
- For each topic, representatives will present the experience of their countries, working methods or models of coordination and information exchange (at national, bilateral, or multilateral levels).
 Subsequently, the floor will be opened for contributions from other States and stakeholders to the issue.
- The discussions will focus on defining proposals for the implementation of the Recommendations and on identifying next steps towards this goal.
- During each thematic session the participants will reflect on necessary actions to meet the needs
 of families and to provide them with information on search, investigation, and identification
 actions.
- At the end of each thematic session, member States will have greater clarity on possible bilateral or multilateral agreements for information exchange and flow, the roadmap to carry them through and the establishment of focal points.

PROFILE OF THE PARTICIPANTS

The participation of two representatives from each of the Member Countries is expected, among the following profiles, in order of priority:

- Representatives of institutions responsible for the search and identification of deceased persons (medic-legal system, police, prosecution, and forensic institutions),
- Representatives of national search commissions for missing persons,
- Representatives of prosecutors' offices in charge of investigations into the disappearance of migrants,
- Ombudspersons' offices that are members of existing forensic banks in the region,
- Representatives of consulates and Ministries of Foreign Affairs,
- Representatives of National Migration Institutes,
- Representatives of RNCOM, ICRC, OACNUDH and IOM.
